# Starting and Managing a Family Tree DNA Project

Family Tree DNA has over 7,000 surname, geographical, heritage, lineage and haplogroup projects. All projects are run by volunteers who have a passion for genetic genealogy. # **Overview of Family Tree DNA Projects**

- Family Tree DNA has more than 7,000 surname, geographical, heritage, lineage and haplogroup projects.
- All projects run by volunteers
- You don't need to be a genetic genealogy expert to manage a project
- Free projects, free project administration tools and free project websites
- Free for Family Tree DNA customers to join

# Why Start a DNA Project?

- Easier to encourage others to test when you have an organized project.
- Project websites are a great way to share results with others interested in the same topic area.
- Group General Fund facilitates fundraising for projects. Family Tree DNA holds donated funds in reserve for each project, freeing individual project administrators from having to directly handle the money.

#### Requesting a New DNA Project

Step 1: Search the Family Tree DNA Project database to confirm that there isn't already a project that covers the surname, geographical area, heritage, lineage or haplogroup that you wish to start a project for:

Step 2: Once you confirm that a project doesn't already exist, submit a request using FTDNA's New Project Application:


Step 3: Wait for the Project Approval email from Family Tree DNA. Please allow 5 business days for Family Tree DNA to review and approve your request.

#### **Accessing Your New DNA Project**

- Your approval email contains a temporary project ID and passcode use this to access your new project for the first time.
- Associate your new project with your Group Administrator Page (GAP):
  - o If you do not already have a GAP account, follow the instructions to create a personalized username and password for your GAP.
  - o If you already have a GAP account, follow the instructions to add your new project to your existing GAP.

## **Group Administrator Page (GAP)**

- Menu Bar
  - All project administration tools are available in the Member Reports, Genetic Reports, Project Administration, My Account and Resources sections.



## **Configure Your GAP Account Settings**

- My Account / Contact Info
  - You can add additional email addresses here if you want to use a different email addresses to manage some of your projects.
- My Account / My Settings
  - Choose the email address to use for each project and choose your notification and display settings.
- My Account / Change Password
  - o Change your GAP account password if needed.
- My Account / Add Projects
  - o Simple way to add new projects to your existing GAP once approved.

### **Configure Your New Project**

- Project Administration / Project Profile
  - Set your Project Name & Description
  - Skip the Website field for now
  - o Check or uncheck "Allow Order without join request?"
  - o Check or uncheck "Show project in Surname Project List?"
  - o Enter surnames and/or keywords relevant to your project
- Project Administration / Public Website
  - Site Configuration Tab: Set the project's website title, configure website options, and create a website address for your project.
  - The following tabs are each optional and will display information on your project's public website if configured:
    - Background Tab: Enter brief information about the purpose of your project
    - Goals Tab: Discuss the goals of your project
    - News Tab: Post project updates
    - Results Tab: Discuss results of the project
- So back to Project Profile and enter your new project website address.
- Project Administration / Welcome Email
  - o Configure an automated welcome message to be sent to new members of your project

### **Project Administration**

- Configure your project
  - Project Profile Configure basic info about your project
  - o Public Website Configure your project's public website
  - Public Results Display Settings Choose whether to display Y-DNA and mtDNA results for individual project members. Most useful for dual geographical projects, where members may have either paternal or maternal ancestry relevant to the project, but not both.
  - o Welcome Email Automated welcome email sent when member joins the project.
  - o Project Administrators Invite additional administrators or co-administrators to your project. You can limit the capabilities of co-admins after they join.
- Manage project members
  - Member Subgrouping Subgroup your members for display on the public website, for sending targeted group emails, or various other reasons. You decide how to best subgroup your members – some ideas are: by lineage, haplogroup, origin, etc.
  - o Join Authorization If your project requires administrator approval for joins, you can manage and respond to join requests here.
  - Bulk Email Send email announcements to all your project members or subgroups of your project members.
  - New Member Order Order a new kit for your project.
- Project financial information
  - o General Fund Contribution details and balance
  - o General Fund Charts Charts showing fund status over time
  - Unpaid Products View project member orders that haven't been paid for yet and make a payment from the project's general fund.
- Price Comparison − View a complete list of FTDNA products, retail prices, group prices and sale prices.

#### Recruitment

- Post announcement to surname mailing lists and forums at Ancestry, RootsWeb, etc.
- Coordinate with one-name studies such as those at the Guild of One Name Studies (GOONS)

- Post to genealogy mailing lists and forums at Ancestry, RootsWeb, JewishGen, etc.
- Post to genetic genealogy mailing lists and forums.
- Email individuals listed in surname databases, such as the JewishGen FamilyFinder http://www.jewishgen.org/jgff/
- Search social media sites such as Facebook and Twitter for people with your surname, as well as Skype.
- Just traditional methods such as searching the white pages and calling people, where appropriate.
- **Recommendation**: If contacting an individual directly, discuss genealogy before asking the person to join a DNA project. Not everyone is warm to the idea of DNA testing, so for best results, introduce individuals to the concept of DNA testing for genealogy slowly don't send a request to join the DNA project as your first correspondence with someone.

## **Privacy Concerns**

- Assure potential participants that they shouldn't have privacy concerns:
  - o Genetic Genealogy tests are non-medical.
  - o Insurance companies don't care about genealogy results.
  - o Genetic Genealogy tests are not legally useful there's no chain of custody. You could have your name and contact info on a friend or relative's kit.
  - o Genetic Genealogy tests are different from law enforcement DNA tests.

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0	Participant names can be anonymized in the FTDNA database. Goal of Genetic Genealogy is to match relatives, <u>not</u> to be uniquely identified.
